# From the Principals Desk...

General Illness: Term three unfortunately tends to be the term where we are inundated with various illnesses. With all this in mind, we know it is tough for families when children are sick and we ask that you consider the wellbeing of others if there is illness within your family.

We have had a case of chickenpox reported to us in the past few days and there are various forms of colds, flus, tummy bugs and sore throats -Leading to strep throat being reported regularly. When we are notified of such illnesses we refer to the following Ministry of Health guideline chart for next steps. https://www.kidshealth.org.nz/ infectious-diseases-at-glance

We will again talk to children and we also ask you to help reinforce the habits of ...

- Handwashing
- · Sneezing into cuffs of elbows
- · Sanitising hands using sanitiser

We also have a weekly cycle of cleaning desks and surfaces to help reduce build up.

Measles: There has been a third case of measles confirmed in Taranaki, and parents and caregivers are being urged to be aware of the signs and symptoms of the illness. Your child may have measles if they have not been vaccinated and have:

- · A high fever
- · A runny nose, sore red eyes or a cough
- · A rash 3-5 days later which usually starts on the head and spreads down the body.

If you think you or your child might have measles, you need to keep them home from school and

Welcome: It is with pleasure that away from public places and other people. Measles is highly contagious from before symptoms start until 5 days after Dear Parents. Our Annual cross the rash has appeared.

> Please contact your doctor or Healthline on 0800 611116 for more advice and let your school or early childhood centre know that your child may have measles.

> Vaccination is the best protection against measles. Children are routinely immunised with the MMR vaccine at age 15 months and 4 years. Children are considered 'fully immunised' against measles when they have two documented measles or MMR vaccinations.

12 noon Special Character Leader to say an Opening Prayer.



All students at school do kapa haka in the first term of the year, after which they can choose whether or not they want to be part of the kapa haka group. We practise on monday afternoon for an hour with our tutor Whaea Unity. This year we have 90 students in our kapa haka group.

Last Friday night we were so proud to have 74 of our tamariki performing on the stage at the Tatarakihi Primary School Cultural Festival. This was the first time SJB have performed at this festival. It was also the first time we have performed our school waiata 'Hato Hoani Paukau' with the actions that we have been working hard to learn this year. Thank you so much to the big group of people who worked hard to help ensure that we were able to have them all look so amazing. Thanks to those who came to help at practises, made more poi, sorted and fitted uniforms, sewed, ironed, and helped get them ready on the day. Thank you also to all our whanau that came to watch and support our tamariki. You will notice that our kotiro (girls) are wearing the three white feathers in their hair. These are a symbol that is recognised

as being associated with Parihaka. We wear them with pride and reverence, whilst remembering their history and that they represent 'peace' and our Christian 'gospel values'.

The raukura (white feather) became a symbol of peace and pride for the people of Parihaka. When Te Whiti died in 1907, a

kaumātua called Charles Waitara spoke at his tangi, saying:

"Let this be clearly understood by all Māoris, Pākehās and all other nations. The white feather is a sign that all nations through

the world will be one; black, red and all others who are called human beings. This feather will be the sign of unity, prosperity, peace and goodwill." (from Caritas website)
