We have continued our annual focus in the first week of November sharing the Story of Parihaka. Unfortunately due to covid restrictions our community hangi won't be able to go ahead this year. I'm so disappointed about this as I have over the past 6-7 years loved watching our community come together for a meal and spend some time reflecting on this historical event.

The track has been a huge hit this week. I've just come back in from a full on lunch time on the track. It was fascinating that our normally busy basketball courts were empty and the field was jam packed with kids. scooters and roller skates. We will very soon acknowledge the funding and resource behind this cool addition to our school. We have kept it a small wheels track for the first few days but will in the coming days open it up to big wheels days (bikes).

PARIHAKA Day 4th & 5th of November: St John Bosco School continues to work on strengthening its knowledge to support the learning about Parihaka and their teachings in our school. The teachings or focus we take at St John Bosco is derived from a statement by Tohu and Te Whiti to their whanau, "Hoki atu ki ō koutou kāinga, Parihaka mai ai" (Go back to your homes and enact Parihaka's principled practice there). Enacting Parihaka-based principled practice is a shift in curriculum focus from an historico-centric study to a sociocultural practice and a community values of two great leaders of the development-based approach. past within our community.

Currently in the covid world some of our traditional tikanga approaches cannot be continued due to current For example our restrictions. gathering of food for a hangi, inviting whanau to come to school for a shared kai. HOwever we will in a revised and safe way continue to focus on the three key concepts that we are developing. 1. Tou Kai - Food cultivation. Rongo-mā-tāne, is the foundation of peace, linked with collective action, cooperation, asserting identity and occupation, and building capacity to provide hospitality. 2. Harakeke -Harakeke represents the wider principle espoused by Tohu and Te Whiti to make use of materials available to you or are accessible within your natural environment. Live sustainably and within your means. 3. Karanga-a-Rongo -Rongo is associated with cultivated food and the concept of peace. Karanga ā-Rongo is the call to people to come and share a meal. The way we eat in these settings is for food to be made available for people to eat what they need, to have their hunger eased and to find peace in the hospitality of their hosts. This is peace in practice.

> At the same time we want to teach our children important aspects of our very own local history. The story of Parihaka is about peaceful resistance and is more relevant to us as New Zealanders than the story of Guy Fawkes (5 November). With Guy Fawkes widely celebrated it is an ideal time to raise the profile of the peaceful resistance to invasion that occurred at Parihaka on 5 November 1881 and enact the

These values and actions also fit so beautifully with our very own catholic faith and pastoral care.

- · A prayer service allowing us to contemplate and pray for the people of Parihaka in their house group only.
- · House Activities based on Parihaka
- · Kapa Haka Practice for the big house singing competition.
- A Lunch cooked by Mr Luckin for all children- A Hamburger for each child (Shared Kai) There will be vegetarian options as well.
- Kapa Haka singing competition.

Teacher Only Day: We have scheduled our final teacher only day for 2021 to take place on Friday 26th November. School will be closed on this day.

Vaccine Mandate in Education: The past few weeks we've been unpacking what this means for us as a school and a community. This week we have had more specific direction and instruction in relation to parents helpers, camps, school events etc from the Ministry of Education. As we form our St John Bosco interpretation of this direction we will inform you all.

At this stage we will continue to follow our Level 2 guidelines up until the 15th November:

- We ask that children who are sick or showing symptoms please stay home.
- We ask that students are not onsite prior to 8:10am. To allow sanitising of classrooms to be completed.
- We are asking families to only visit classes if essential or only if children require support to transition to school. Parents who come on site must log in via the school app or through the Covid19 QR code at all our main entrances. Adults must wear a mask. It is not mandatory for children under the age of 12 to wear a mask. It is also not mandatory for school staff to wear masks whilst on site.
- We are encouraging families to drop children at one of our three main entrances in the morning, walkway gates, front entrance on Clinton Street or through our courtyard gate.

- Parents must enforce social distancing of 2m while waiting to drop or collect children.
- We will continue our h and sanitising protocols on arrival to school and throughout the day.
- All common area surfaces will be sanitised daily.

Our drinking fountains will also be closed while we are at Level 2, so children will need to bring a named drink bottle each day. We ask that families leave school grounds soon after school finishes for the day.


