Ambrose Golf Day Sun 27 March Covid Update: Last week saw covid become one step closer to St John Bosco School. Our current situation as of Monday morning is, a number of children and 2 staff isolating as household contacts and 1 confirmed student as a case. We are expecting more cases will come. Our contact with a case last week allowed us to a ction our systems of identifying contacts and informing whanau. Our management team and myself were really happy with how it worked.

I want to thank families for keeping me informed of any developments in relation to covid. I also want to congratulate families who have a positive household case for their very calm and professional way of working through the 10 days of isolation. I also want to say thank you to our families who have been keeping unwell children at home to prevent the spread of a number of bugs.

Last week we had a daily average of 10 children away. Many schools are talking about 30-40% of their school roll away. So this gives a picture that last week we were very early on in our covid journey. Today we have 37 children away, the playing field is changing.

Over the past week, our goal has been to place our energy on focused teaching and learning programmes for all learners onsite, whilst facing and preparing for the challenges of students and staff being impacted by the effects of COVID in our community. We are expecting more children and staff will soon be in a situation that they will be isolating. We have considered many variables and teachers are aware that there is going to be a need to be flexible and agile in our planning and organisation in the weeks to come. Our staff have been finalising their teaching and learning plans for our COVID Response plan. I am incredibly proud of the way our staff are responding to the demands of this time. They have been and will continue to work hard for our children.

As we move through different phases we will keep you informed.

Please continue to follow our basic guidelines of...

- Staying away if you are unwell.
- Washing / sanitising hands when and where required.
- Adults on site wearing face masks and social distancing.
- Children in Years 4-6 wearing face masks inside.
- Leaving the school premises as soon as you can after school.

Arrival of Children to School: Just a reminder that staff prior to 8:30am are involved in meetings or preparing teaching resources for the day. They may not be available to supervise or meet children prior to this. Children are asked to stay in their classes prior to 8:30am as this is a safe place for them.

Te Ara a Maria.

On Thursday Rooms Totara and Kauri had the opportunity to visit and learn some quite specific information about a beautiful piece of commissioned art - Te Ara a Maria or Mary's Way and the rededication of Aotearoa to Mary Mother of God. There were many special links between the piece of art, the Gospel and our Faith. The following is some more specific information. On Sunday 15 August, 2021, the New Zealand Catholic Bishops renewed our country's dedication to Mary, Mother of God, Assumed into Heaven. The Bishop's have called this Te Ara a Maria – Mary's Way. Bishop Pompallier was New Zealand's first bishop. He journeyed from France to support the growth of our Church in Oceania. Pompallier made his dedication while celebrating his first Mass here in 1838.

In the Hokianga, Pompallier learnt Te Reo and developed an understanding of Māori spirituality. The partnerships he built helped encourage local iwi to explore the Catholic faith. These important steps would see Hokianga become the cradle of Catholicism in Aotearoa. Pompallier's dedication honours Mary as the Virgin Mother of Jesus. To mark the renewal of the dedication, our Bishops held a special Mass at St Mary of the Angels in Wellington on 15 August, 2021.

This service saw the unveiling of artwork specially commissioned to honour Mary. To celebrate the rededication, the Bishops had commissioned a new piece of art. They wanted a depiction of Mary that connects her to Aotearoa. The piece challenges us to see her as a woman of incredible strength and the place she holds in our hearts and our community today. The artwork aims to respect our different cultures and backgrounds. The painting captures details which are unique to our country and Catholic identity.





RELIGIOUS EDUCATION AT SJB

THE POPE'S PRAYER INTENTION MARCH 2022 A Christian Response to Bioethical Challenges:

We pray for Christians facing new bioethical challenges; may they continue to defend the dignity of all human life with prayer and action.

ASH WEDNESDAY:

Yesterday we began the season of Lent with Ash Wednesday celebrations. Each collaboration held an Ash Wednesday Liturgy and the children received the Blessed Ashes. This is a reminder to try to turn away from sinful things and be sorry for any wrongdoing. Lent is a season of repentance and turning back to GOD!



Ashes and Ash Wednesday: The origin and custom of using ashes is discovered in part in the *Old Testament*.

They accompanied prayer in the case of Abraham when he said to God: "Let me take it upon myself to speak to my Lord, I who am but dust and ashes."

The prophet Jeremiah uses ashes when he calls for repentance: "O daughter of my people, gird on sackcloth, roll in ashes" (Jer. 6:26).

The prophet Daniel pleaded for God to rescue Israel with sackcloth and ashes as a sign of Israel's repentance: "I turned to the Lord

God, pleading in earnest prayer, with fasting, sack-cloth and ashes" (Dan. 9:3).

Lenten Blessing

Lent calls us to make daily choices that will help us to grow in our relationship with ourselves, God and others.

As we journey through Lent, let us also be mindful of those currently faced with uncertainty and conflict in the world - especially in Ukraine.

May our fasting fuel a hunger for justice.

May our acts of **almsgiving** promote peace and hope.

May our **prayers** be the chant of grateful hearts that unite and empower your one human family to strive for harmony.

In the New Testament, Jesus refers to the use of sackcloth and ashes as signs of repentance: "Alas for you, Chorazin! Alas for you, Bethsaida! For if the miracles done in you had been done in Tyre and Sidon, they would have repented long ago in sackcloth and ashes" (Mt 11:21: Lk 10:13).

Ash Wednesday 2022



Do you know what is so special about Ash Wednesday? We commemorated the beginning of Lent yesterday, on the 2nd of March by joining together for a liturgy led by Mrs Baldwin, Mrs Welsh and Nana Mary.

Firstly we lit our purple candle, said some prayers, listened to some readings and sang the song "Out of the Ashes". We had a purple prayer mat to signify the beginning of Lent based on our lituraical calendar.

The ashes are usually placed on the forehead as a visible sign that we are followers of Jesus. Normally we receive the ashes in the Sign of the Cross on our forehead. They remind us that we need to make changes in our lives to be more like Jesus. Yesterday some ashes were sprinkled on our heads as we were being mindful of our covid restrictions.

The ashes used on Ash Wednesday are made by burning the palms that have been saved from the previous year's Palm Sunday. The ashes are then blessed by a priest before they are distributed.

During Lent we will be generous, we will be prayerful, we will think of others and we will get ready to celebrate Easter.

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




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
