What a week for our school. It was great to see so many of you at the blessing of our waharoa on Tuesday morning. This project encapsulated 82 years worth of history and has been many years in the making. It has been the culmination of an 8 year drive with the Maori Achievement Collaborative (MAC) to ensure we can confidently answer the question: How do we know this is a school in Aotearoa, New Zealand? It is all the work in the Te ao maori space in these previous years that has enabled us to put this in the ground and feel confident that we are doing so with authenticity.

What is it? It acts as a gateway or portal. Marae always have a waharoa at their entrance that visitors must wait outside before being welcomed on. The concept is also that as we walk through it each day, it catches all our worries and cleanses us of what has happened prior and enables us to start a fresh each day, ready to be our best selves.

Who carved it? Matua Kenny Trinder. We are connected to him through the Normanton family who have been a part of our school for a very long time now. He is also our key link to Muru Raupatu marae. He is now off to work on carvings at the New Plymouth airport, so keep an eye out for them.

How was it decided what went on it? For the past year we have held whanau hui to learn about waharoa and generate ideas alongside consultation of staff, students and family. Each part tells a story or symbolises something of significance to Te Atiawa and/or St John Bosco school.

A huge thanks to all those that contributed to our 2024 community hangi. All the donations, all the volunteering and positive vibes. In particular, Michael Normanton and the crew that put in the huge shift throughout the day to get us fed! I want to also thank Michael, Kenny and Dave for the enormous effort on Monday to get our Waharoa in the ground.

What a day for our kura and what an honour to be a part of.

Waharoa Explanation

AWANUI-Ā-RANGI



Awanuiarangi was the son of Tamarau and Rongoueroa. He is the eponymous ancestor of Te Ātiawa.

The descendants of Awanuiarangi, the Awa people, occupied Taranaki for many generations. Te Ātiawa is sometimes referred to as the Awa tribes or Ngāti Awa. Te Ātiawa connects with the three hapū, Te Kahui Tu, Te Kahui Rangī and Te Kahui Tawake. These hapū originated from the ancestor Rua Taranaki, whose son Taurangi was the first known man to climb Maunga Taranaki, naming it after his father.

WAHAROA MAIHI EXPLANATION OF THE IMAGES



The maihi represents the arms of the waharoa with the intention of welcoming all manuiri / visitors to the school. Manaia - guardians of the school are representative of the historic pā (villages) that surround the school site.

Mission Sisters Cross

The Sisters of Our Lady of Missions carry out work in 20 countries across the world, responding to the needs of the people with a primary focus on education and women's empowerment. It was Euphrasie Barbier as part of the mission sisters who founded our school.

Tawhirikura

Tawhirikura was a female Rangatira of her time. All hapū members of Ngāti Tawhirikura whakapapa back to this wāhine. Rewarewa Pā housed the largest population of Ngāti Tawhirikura people. Katere ki te moana is their only active modern day marae.

Waiwhakaiho Awa

The Waiwhakaiho River is located in the suburb of Fitzroy, New Plymouth and flows from Taranaki Maunga to the Tasman Sea. It is one of the largest rivers in the Te Ātiawa rohe and has several tributaries including the Mangaone and Mangorei.

Poutama

The Poutama has significant spiritual and educational meanings. The stepped pattern symbolises levels of attainment and advancement and the growth of man, striving ever upwards and for betterment.

St John Bosco Tohu

With the blessing of Koro Rangikotuku Rukuwai of Parihaka Pā, Toroanui Marae, Jeremy Moa collaborated with the school to create a tohu that reflected the school's dual heritage.

Te Whiti the first

Ngāti Te Whiti traces descent from our eponymous ancestor - Te Whiti o Rongomai - who lived in the late 1700s. The 'Hapū rohe' extends from the Herekawe to the Waiwhakaiho River, inland to its headwaters on Taranaki and back to the Herekawe.

POU - TAHA WĀHINE



Rongoueroa

Rongoueroa was the mother of Awanuiarangi, ancestor of Te Āti Awa. She is also the mother of Rauru Kitahi, the ancestor from whom Ngā Rauru take their name. Also Whātonga whose son Tara is the ancestor who named the Wellington Harbour - Te Whanganui ā Tara.

Euphrasie Barbier

Euphrasie Barbier was born at Caen, Normandy, France, on 4 January 1829. She was the founder of a religious missionary congregation whose members would live the grace of consecration for the Divine Missions through contemplation, communion and mission.

Cross & Rosary Beads

Rosary beads are represented by the brown notches along the pou.

Pohutukawa and Puriri Trees

These trees have a long history within our school and were planted when Northgate motorway was put in.

School Houses

Darnell and Barbier. Two of the four school 'House' groupings are represented on each of the pou by a small whareniui, identified by the associated house colours.



POU - TAHA TĀNE



Tamarau

Tamarau-Te-Heketanga-A-Rangi (Tamarau), a whatukura or heavenly guardian from the tenth heaven. A child of Ranginui and Papatūānuku, Tamarau came down from the heavens after seeing Rongoueroa bathing beside a stream. He took the form of a man and embraced her. From their union, Awanuiarangi was born.

St John Bosco

Our school Patron Saint, John Bosco was born in Italy in 1815 and died in 1888. He was a Priest who established a home for young boys. John Bosco founded a congregation of religious sisters called The Daughters of Our Lady Help of Christians.

Traditional School Logo

As featured on our school uniforms.

Raukura

In 2013, Caritas responded to a growing desire by Catholic parishes and schools to honour the memory of Parihaka. SJB was involved in the developing resources and strengthening relationships between the Catholic Diocese and Parihaka. The white feather symbolises the peaceful teachings of the prophets Te Whiti-o-Rongomai and Tohu Kākahi, who lived at the Taranaki village of Parihaka.

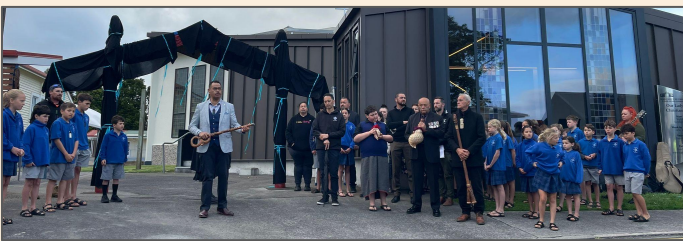

Term 4 Prayer

Term 4 Religious Education learning

This term our learning theme is Kia Noho Hāhi Being Church. It focuses on how we should live our best life, one which is built on the Good News of Jesus' teachings. Children will begin to develop an understanding of Catholic Tradition and teaching as well as God's call in their life - having the chance to reflect on the direction of their life, their own choices and the impact those choices may have. Where possible the young people will be given the chance to serve others in practical ways - to put their learning into practice.



October

October - The month of the Rosary

This year we prayed the Sorrowful, the Glorious and the Luminous Mysteries during October. It was pleasing to hear that many of you made the Rosary part of your prayer time at home as well.

Catholics have been given a very special gift in the rosary. The month of October each year is dedicated to the Holy Rosary. It is based on incidents in the life of Jesus and Mary. The use of beads or knotted ropes to count large numbers of prayers comes from the earliest days of Christianity. However, this way of prayer precedes Christianity. The development of the rosary as we know it today has gone through many stages. Christian Monks used this method to pray the Psalms. Today the rosary consists of in total 150 Hail Marys, divided into three sets of 50, which are further divided into five sets of 10 (a decade).

The rosary tells the story of Jesus' life in four parts:

The Joyful Mysteries - tell us about Jesus' birth and his early life

The Sorrowful Mysteries - teach us about the suffering and death of Jesus on the cross

The Glorious Mysteries - are about Jesus' resurrection and the glorious life that awaits us in heaven

The Luminous Mysteries - tell about Jesus' ministry when he went out to teach people about God.

Mission Sunday

World Mission Month is our chance to show love and solidarity to our brothers and sisters overseas who share our faith. In offering our prayers, we join with missionaries everywhere in communion and compassion to support them in spreading the Good News, and by giving a donation we respond to Christ's call to feed the hungry and clothe the naked.

Mission Sunday is the one Sunday in the year when the Mass is celebrated exclusively for missionary activity. Donations are collected at these worldwide Masses and they go, in their entirety, to support churches, hospitals, schools and vocations in countries where the Church is new, young or poor.

World Mission Sunday was celebrated on Sunday 20 October as part of Mission Month. The Monday following we had a mufti day and raised **\$392.50** to help support Pope Francis in his missionary endeavours around the world. God bless you and thank you for your generous donation to help support those less fortunate than ourselves.

November

All Saints Day - 1 November In the year 835 AD the Catholic Church made 1st November a church holiday to honour all the saints. This feast day is called All Saints' Day. It annually reminds us of our connectedness as Christians. Perhaps, you were taught to think of saints as statues in a church building. The Bible teaches something completely different. Who is a saint? You are. That is, if you're a follower of Jesus. There are saints who died for their faith - the martyrs. All of them are honoured by the church.



All Souls' Day - 2 November On All Souls' Day the Catholic Church remembers all those who have died - not just the great and the good, but ordinary and especially those loved ones.

Why do Catholics honour Saints ?

The Church teaches that the saints are in communion with the Holy Spirit, interceding for us in Heaven. For this reason, we ask the saints for help. The point of calling and petitioning to the saints is because they were very close to God when they lived and even now in death.

Worship is reserved exclusively for God. Instead, when Catholics pray to saints, we are asking for their prayers and intercession on our behalf.



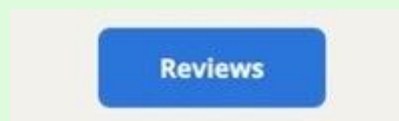
